All Sentences need THREE Things

- 1. A subject
- 2. A verb
- 3. A complete thought

# Parts of Speech/Parts of a Sentence


- Sentences are broken into parts
- Those parts are broken into parts of speech. To understand one, you must understand the other.

### The Complete Thought


More complicated than it sounds.

Essentially, having a complete thought simply means that the reader isn't left "hanging."

More on this later.



#### Subject



- The subject is the "star" of the sentence
- It is the the word that the sentence is about
- the subject of the sentence is either:
  - doing something,
  - or being something.

### Parts of Speech

- A subject is always one of the following parts of speech:
  - Noun
  - Pronoun
  - (A phrase that acts like a noun. We'll get to that MUCH later)

#### Noun

- A word that names a person, place, thing, or idea.
  - Common Noun: General
  - Proper: Specific (always capitalized).

- Common Nouns:
- man, town, bridge, justice
- Proper Nouns:
- George, Antioch, Golden Gate Bridge
  - (can you think of a proper idea? I don't know if I can...)

#### Pronoun

- Part of Speech
- Used to replace a noun
- use pronouns to avoid silly repetition

- He
- She
- |t
- Us
- Them
- They
- We

#### Predicate

- The predicate is the other half of the sentence
- It contains a verb
- The predicate is either what the subject is,
  - or what the subject is doing.

#### Stick to Action

- We won't do the whole "state of being" thing yet.
- For now, focus on Action Verbs, the verbs that show what the subject is doing.

- Action Verbs:
- Run
- Eat
- Think
- Play
- Sleep

- Dogs eat.
- Stars burn.
- Cats judge.
- Elephants remember.
- Starfish slurp.

### Diagramming

- A way of showing how words are related in a sentence.
- A place for every word and every word in its place


